1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Paramekkavu College of Arts and Science, affiliated with the University of Calicut, follows a prescribed syllabus. The institution employs a Choice Based Credit and Semester System for all undergraduate and postgraduate programs, which includes elective courses. The delivery of courses combines blended learning, incorporating classroom sessions, workshops, seminars, certificate programs, and various projects and assignments. The college is dedicated to achieving its educational goals by clearly defining Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes, ensuring the development of desired competencies. Academic activities are supported by an academic calendar, timetable, and instructor's course file, all aligned with the University Academic Calendar. The college features a modern, inclusive infrastructure with a well-stocked library, computer labs, and unrestricted Wi-Fi access. Every department follows a student-centric approach, with a strong emphasis on quality teaching and learning. The curriculum is designed to promote ethical values, human values, and environmental studies. Faculty members consistently update their academic and subject knowledge by participating in faculty development programs, curriculum reviews, evaluations, and various seminars, workshops, and conferences. All students complete field projects, internships, or student projects, addressing cross-cutting issues crucial for skill development and employability. These issues include environmental sustainability, professional ethics, human values, and gender. The institution enhances the curriculum through additional add-on and certificate courses, complementing the university's syllabus and staying current with global developments. The well-maintained library provides sufficient books and e-resources to support a robust curriculum. The institute ensures the quality of teaching and learning through the Internal Quality Assurance

Cell (IQAC) and other relevant bodies, which gather feedback from students and stakeholders. Regular parent-teacher meetings are also held to foster communication and improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution adheres to the Government and Affiliated University admission policy, ensuring transparency, inclusivity, and equity. The admission process is clear and serves students from diverse backgrounds, including economically disadvantaged sections of society. Seats are reserved for SC, ST, OBC, and Divyangjan according to Government norms. Each year, the Student Induction Programme is organized to welcome new students. Academic and examination calendars are distributed to all stakeholders in both digital and printed formats for easy reference and accessibility. The student-teacher ratio is 19:1. In collaboration with the IQAC, the Staff Council prepares a comprehensive Action Plan that engages students with a schedule enriched by certificate courses, field trips, industrial visits, internships, and co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The Academic Calendar and syllabus approved by the University of Calicut serve as a broad roadmap for the academic year. The college has an adequate number of smart classrooms and an effective Learning Management System (LMS). Students have access to N-LIST, an institutional repository, and a digital question bank. Internal assessments are conducted systematically and transparently by the Internal Examination Committee (IEC), according to the academic calendar schedule. The college adopts Outcome Based Education (OBE) and introduces it to students as part of their educational framework. Course Outcomes (CO) and Programme Outcomes (PO) are prominently displayed on the college website and department notice boards. CO-PO Mapping is facilitated through the NETCAMPUS app to integrate OBE effectively. The institution promotes ICT-enabled teaching through learning systems such as NLIST, digital resources, Google Classroom, and PowerPoint presentations. The curricula integrate components of skill development, employability, and entrepreneurship. All sanctioned teaching positions are filled with qualified teachers.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Paramekkavu College of Arts and Science fosters an innovative ecosystem and facilitates knowledge transfer by offering various opportunities to students and staff. All innovation and extension activities are centered around students, with numerous initiatives conducted to stimulate and develop their minds. The college library offers access to the N-LIST subscription to support research. Students and staff participate in the Institution's Innovation Council (IIC), Young Innovative Programme (YIP), and ICT Academy. The college has functional MOUs with various institutions and organizations to enhance academic and practical knowledge, as well as job skills awareness. Programs related to research methodology, intellectual property rights, entrepreneurship, and skill development are regularly organized. The Entrepreneurship Development Cell focuses on nurturing self-employment skills. The college is well-known for its extension activities in the community, with programs conducted through the NSS and other clubs and cells. The college has received awards and recognitions from the Government and other esteemed bodies for its extension activities. These activities encompass various categories, including community development, social work, health awareness, health camps, blood donation camps, environmental awareness, and gender sensitization.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The green-certified campus, covering a built-up area of 6763.7 sq.m, boasts well-designed facilities for both academic and extracurricular activities. The institution features ICT-enabled smart classrooms, well-equipped

seminar halls, an audio-visual production studio, and an auditorium. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled, with all departments, offices, and labs connected to a LAN, and offers 300 Mbps high-speed internet connections in computer laboratories, classrooms, the library, and seminar halls. There are numerous computing systems available for students in the lab, as well as sufficient systems for teachers and administrative purposes. The campus provides sports facilities for football, cricket, badminton, and more. A high-power generator ensures complete power backup. The college has an RFID-enabled, fully automated library with over 7,000 books, managed using NETCAMPUS software. The library provides remote access to e-resources through its digital library, mainly accessed via platforms like N-LIST and e-shodhsindhu. The college has established committees such as the Library Committee and the Infrastructure and Maintenance Committee to monitor and maintain its physical infrastructure. The institution is committed to upgrading technological resources, maintaining campus cleanliness with proper waste disposal, and supporting Green Campus initiatives. The campus is equipped with amenities for individuals with disabilities, including ramps, accessible restrooms, and wheelchairs, ensuring a welcoming environment for everyone. Resources like Non-Visual Desktop Access (NVDA) are provided for visually impaired students, offering the necessary support and accessibility tools to ensure an inclusive learning environment.

Student Support and Progression

Paramekkavu College is committed to its motto "Shradhaya Labhate Jhanam," striving to support students in acquiring quality education and achieving professional success. The college has a robust student support system and takes proactive measures to assist students in their academic and extracurricular pursuits. Many students at the college are eligible for scholarships, and the college management sponsors students from economically disadvantaged families annually. A significant number of graduating students secure placements or pursue higher education. Various departments organize programs to enhance students' soft skills, language and communication skills, computing/ICT skills, and life skills. Career counseling, guidance, training for competitive exams, and placement activities are conducted through the Career Guidance and Placement Cell and various departments. Students' ICT and computing skills are developed using online platforms and the digital library. Over the past five years, students have won numerous awards, prizes, and medals for their outstanding performance in sports and cultural activities at university, state, and national levels. Students have access to both offline and online facilities for reporting grievances, and the Students Grievance Redressal Cell addresses these grievances promptly. The College Union collaborates with teachers and management to organize various college activities and programs. The Paramekkavu Alumni Association (Reg.No: TSR/TC/219/2024) actively participates on campus in close partnership with the management, staff, and students, providing scholarships, placement and internship opportunities, and job-oriented practical training.

Governance, Leadership and Management

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic bank of credits (ABC): The college administration wholeheartedly endorses the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) concept outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and is committed to its full implementation once introduced by the affiliating University in the upcoming academic sessions. To facilitate this, a dedicated Nodal Officer has been appointed to oversee the ABC and associated admission processes. provided by the affiliating university and the Higher Education Department of Kerala State. To support this initiative, the institution must become an official member of the National Academic Depository, a government initiative that provides an online repository for all academic awards under the Digital India Programme. This membership will significantly aid students in their academic mobility. Our institution already follows a choice-based credit system for the programmes taught, which will facilitate the implementation process of the ABC. By aligning with the NEP 2020's vision and adopting the ABC framework, our institution aims to enhance the flexibility and accessibility of higher education for our students, ensuring a seamless and efficient academic experience.

The systematic and meticulous audits make the accounts and transactions transparent. The internal audit is carried out by an experienced expert within the institution itself whereas the statutory

audit is performed by the institution-appointed Chartered Accountant. Internal and external

auditing ensures financial oversight and accountability. The institution's accountant supervises financial activities, updating payments in software after manual verification. Daily transactions are forwarded to the accounting section, with monthly reports submitted during governing body meetings.

The Accountant of the college is responsible for managing the regular receipts and payments accounts across various financial activities of the institution. A petty cash book is maintained to cover recurring small expenses, and all payments are meticulously recorded and manually verified through supporting vouchers. Daily transactions are consolidated, verified by the principal, and submitted to the account section of the management. Monthly financial statements, including Debit, Credit, and Balance, are generated from the software and presented in all governing body meetings. A budget is prepared for infrastructural development and submitted to the management for approval. The institution places a strong emphasis on financial transparency and accountability through a robust internal and external auditing process, ensuring the responsible and effective utilization of financial resources across various facets of its operations.

Snehasparsham: Embracing the Warmth of Compassion

Vision: To cultivate empathy and social responsibility within the college community through meaningful community service.

Mission: To engage students, staff, and faculty in initiatives that support social welfare and promote a culture of compassion and active citizenship.

The Context

Snehasparsham is an initiative by Paramekkavu College of Arts and Science aimed at fostering social welfare and community support. Launched in the academic year 2018-19, it initially focused on distributing noon meals to pain and palliative care unit patients and resumed in 2022-23 with a cloth donation drive in Thrissur district. The objectives are to raise social awareness among students.

Food Kit Distribution: The College partnered with ACTS, a voluntary social organization, to distribute food kits to pain and palliative care patients. After collecting food pack students distributed it at the care center. Cloth Donation: The College collects reusable clothes from students, teachers, and staff.

Donors are instructed to ensure the clothes are not too old or torn and are properly washed,

ironed, and folded. The clothes are then sorted by teachers and handed over to a cloth bank at Pallimoola, where they are distributed to the needy. The funds generated from selling some clothes are used for various social purposes

Evidence of Success: The food pack distribution program has increased students#39; awareness of palliative care needs and fostered a sense of empathy and responsibility. The cloth donation drive has instilled humility and social responsibility among students, contributing to their personal and academic growth.
